







What's An Urban Farm?


- Growing food, fiber, or flowers for donation or sale

- Important for them to have representation and a place to meet their peers





How long have we had urban farms and gardens in Baltimore?

Farms and gardens have always been part of our city's landscape. Several farms that exist now are in neighborhoods that were annexed by the city more recently, such as Hamilton or Curtis Bay. This most recent batch of farms began around 2010-2011, when the City made vacant lots available through a one-year free permit with water for \$120 per year, and then some of the farms that were launched using that program were able to obtain 5-year leases to remain on the land. Other farms are on vacant property that is owned by the Department of Public Works or the Housing Authority of Baltimore City.



How do urban farms and gardens combat food insecurity?

- Located in majority-Black and Brown neighborhoods without access to grocery stores and public transit
- Farm stands and EBT
- Teaching people how to grow their own food
- Demonstrating how the land can be used in the city
